Course requirements:

Performance in this course will be judged on the basis of four bill projects and two candality graded assignments. Each student lwchoose four bills before the Colora can be chosen by only one student. Assignments related to these billwill constitute 80 points, or 80% of the course.

The project for each of these bills will be worth 15 points, or 15% of the course. Each project will consist of three assignments.

The first assignment while a briefing paper. Once a bill is chosen, the student has one week in which to submit a first draft of this paper. If a first draft is not submittent one week, the bill becomes available for other students to choose.

The paper must consist of no mothern five pages, whit additional pages only for referece lists. The paper wilsummarize the relevant literature and present aniginal economic analysis inanguage and, if useful, figurethat would convey the essence of the material to a general audience.
